

OPERATION BLESSING INTERNATIONAL LOADING U.S. NAVY SHIP WITH OVER 200 TONS OF CRITICAL RELIEF SUPPLIES AND 10 HIGH-PRODUCTION WATER PURIFICATION PLANTS

OBI Water Purification Expert To Travel On Ship

USNS Sacagawea To Leave Norfolk Tuesday, January 19 around 4pm

VIRGINIA BEACH, VA (January 18, 2010) – Operation Blessing International (OBI) has secured space onboard the USNS Sacagawea to transport critical disaster relief supplies to help the victims of the earthquake. The ship is being loaded today and tomorrow morning and is expected to depart from Norfolk around 4pm Tuesday (January 19).

Operation Blessing International will be shipping:

- (7) Truckloads of bottled water (175,000 ½-liter bottles)
- (3) Truckloads of baby food (60 tons)
- (10) WMI water plants (each capable of purifying 10,000 gallons a day)
- 350 LifeSaver water bottles (family size water purifiers)
- 5800 Ready-to-eat meals
- 2750 Gallons of diesel fuel

In addition to the cargo, OBI's' water purification expert Joe Scott, a retired U.S. Navy Sea Bee equipment operator, will travel onboard the ship in order to install the WMI water purification plants upon their arrival in Port-au-Prince.

Called the Living Water Treatment System by Water Missions International (WMI), the units use alum as a coagulant, garnet and anthracite for filtration with a back wash system so that they can be used for up to 5 years with no filter replacement costs, and a chlorinator for biological purification. Each unit will produce up to 10,000 gallons of filtered water per day.

The ship will reach Guantanamo, Cuba, in five days. The cargo will be unloaded and U.S. Navy helicopters will transport the supplies to OBI's temporary headquarters at the Port-au-Prince airport.

OBI has been working to help the people of Haiti since May, 2009 and had staff on the ground when the earthquake hit. The charity mobilized its international disaster relief team under the direction of David Darg, who arrived on Friday (Jan. 15th). The charity has been involved in a number of efforts including sourcing trucks to break the logistical logjam at the airport, delivering search and rescue teams to the quake zone, repairing and servicing a reverse osmosis water treatment plant at Haiti's largest hospital, as well as setting up a makeshift medical clinic with a team of 12 doctors from IsraAID (www.israaid.org.il) in the local soccer stadium.
